

As I navigate my last year of high school, here are some pieces of advice I wish someone had given me before I started my journey to college.

You have to think about what's best for you. It sounds obvious, but this sentiment can very easily slip our minds. You might want to pick the school that all of your friends are going to, that's closest to/farthest from home, or that's prestigious, but it might not always be the best option. Just because a school is perfect for others or in theory doesn't mean it's perfect for you. When thinking about college, you should feel that you'll truly be happy there, because it'll be the next four years of your life. Can you see yourself having fun with new friends on campus? Will you be able to find a balance between work and play? Can you and your family afford it? Will it set you up for your future career? These are

just some of the questions that will help you determine your college fit.

It's okay not to have it all figured out right away. My college list has been changing for years, and even by the time this issue is published another college has probably been added to or removed from my list. I wasn't really sure what career I wanted to pursue until last year, and even now I'm still exploring my options. In today's world, there's an expectation for teenagers to plan out the rest of their lives before they've even earned a diploma, but you don't have to know it all. You have time to discover yourself and your passions and how they fit into your college choice. Don't feel pressured to make important decisions immediately — you have the rest of your life to make those.

Get started early. It's easy to procrastinate, but you'll really feel the pressure of college applications during your senior year if you wait last minute. Even if you're not sure which college you're attending, gather the basic requirements for most institutions. First, you'll need one or two letters of recommendation from your teachers. It's important to build relationships with your teachers early on so you have someone to turn to when the time comes. Second, you might need the long, dreaded personal essay. The Common Application offers space for a 650-word essay on various topics. While big, public colleges usually don't require this, you might need smaller, supplemental essays if you're applying to different types of schools or special scholarships. Start thinking about the extracurriculars, life events, and values that are the most important to you and that will be easy to write about. Lastly, keep your grades up and take standardized tests. All colleges will ask to see your transcript, which includes grades from 9th grade on. It's very important to maintain your grades throughout high school because they do matter. Start studying for the ACT (and PSAT) early and start taking them in 10th and 11th grade. Find practice tests online and review concepts you're unfamiliar with regularly. No one likes studying, but these tests could ensure your acceptance or give you thousands of dollars in scholarships.

I hope that this advice will help you feel more confident and prepared for the college application process. Know that there are always people around you willing to help, whether they're college students, family, friends, or staff. This journey doesn't have to be scary; it's preparing you for the best years of your life. Keep your head high, and believe in yourself no matter what!
